## ABOUT MITH SAMLANH

### ORGANIZATION BACKGROUND

MithSamlanh was established in August 1994 and is a Cambodian led non-government organization committed to working with marginalized Cambodian children and youth, their families and communities. MithSamlanh was formally registered as a local Cambodian NGO in 2002. Every year, MithSamlanh provides various outreach programs, vocational training, education, counselling, food, shelter, medical services and income generation programs to 15,000 marginalized children, youth and families in Phnom Penh.

### VISION

Together, we protect marginalized children/youth and related groups and with them create innovative and exciting opportunities to build their futures.

### MISSION

MithSamlanh is a local non Governmental organization, founded by Friends-International and a member of the CYTI Alliance, which works with and for marginalized children, youth, their families and their communities to build their futures.

- **Protecting** marginalized children and youth from all forms of abuse within the scope of the International Convention of the Rights of the Child;
- **Reintegrating** marginalized children and youth so they become actively involved in the development of their society;
- **Preventing** marginalized children and youth from engaging in risky behaviour and/or dangerous situations that compromise their futures;
- **Improving** the way organizations work by promoting innovative and effective approaches with the active participation of the children and youth;

### OVERVIEW

MithSamlanh currently implements seven main programs: protection/outreach; youth empowerment; education; vocational training and employment; family reintegration and alternative care; family income generation; and social business. This work is supported by six specialists (child protection, medical, case management, drugs, lifeskills, ChildSafe) and a senior management team, finance team, admin/HR team and M&E team.

*MITH SAMLANH'S ACHIEVEMENT 2014: January to June*

- 8,160 (F: 3,119) children and youth and 4,013 (F: 2,204) caretakers received services in Phnom Penh and Provinces since 1<sup>st</sup> January 2014.
- 588,754 (F: 216,829) services were provided to children, youth and their caretakers this quarter.
- 361 (F: 96) children and youth were supported to move away from street life since 1<sup>st</sup> January 2014.
- 346 (F: 142) children received remedial education since 1<sup>st</sup> January 2014.
- 26 (F: 15) new children were supported to reintegrate into public school since 1<sup>st</sup> January 2014.
- 1,407 (F: 612) children received support to remain in public school through follow up in Phnom Penh and Provinces since 1st January 2014, and 460 (F: 197) children stopped receiving support because they are successfully supported by their families.
- 419(F:112) youth received vocational training since 1st January 2014.
- 97(F: 21) youth were placed into employment (employment, self-employment, directly into employment and find job by themselves) in Phnom Penh and Provinces since 1st January 2014.
- 377 (F: 106) children and youth accessed safe lodging facilities in 3 Transitional Homes (THs) since 1<sup>st</sup> January 2014.
- 97 (F: 21) children and youth were reintegrated into family environment (direct, extended, foster care, independent living and group living) in Phnom Penh and Provinces since 1st January 2014.
